


Context of State Support

System-level Capacity Imbalance


The imbalance within higher education segments in terms of students, institutions, and system-level support further highlights inequities





Myth #1: CCCs are not preparing more students for transfer

FACT: The number of students that are "transfer-ready" has increased over the last decade including for underrepresented groups, as evidenced below:

Myth #2: Fewer CCC students are applying to the CSU and UC

FACT: The number of CCC students applying to the CSU and UC has increased almost every year for the last decade

Myth #3: Fewer CCC students are being admitted to the CSU and UC

FACT: The number of CCC students admitted to the CSU and UC has increased over the last decade

Myth #4: CCC students perform poorly after transferring to the CSU or UC

FACT: Segment data show that CCC students perform as well or better than students initially starting at the CSU and UC

- The 2-year graduation rate for CCC transfers at the CSU is 44%, which is higher than the 4-year graduation rate for firsttime CSU students, 33%.
- The 6-year graduation rate for CCC students is higher than those for first-time UC students, 89% compared to 86%.



Myth #5: Transfer to the CSU and UC is simpler

FACT: Transfer is not simpler for students <u>or counselors</u>

What does Equitable Transfer Pathways mean?

All students, regardless of which colleges they enroll in:

- Understand curricular pathways associated with their chosen program of study
- Know how to become eligible for transfer to the CSU and/or UC in their chosen program of study
- Understand what it means to be competitive for segment, university and department-level admissions
- Transfer guarantees are consistent and transparent
- Information provided is correct and consistent regardless of who provides counseling





- Two application cycles per year **Due Jan. 15 and Aug. 15**
- 10 BDP applications received in 2022 Cycle #1
- Establish a two year workgroup in March 2022
- Email BDP@CCCCO.edu



AB 928 (Berman)

- Requires ICAS to establish a singular lower division general education pathway
- Requires the CCCs to automatically place students on ADT pathways
- Establishes the ADT Intersegmental Implementation Committee
- Unified GE pattern must be designed by May 2023
- Fall 2025 implementation on campuses

Student Outcomes and Impact

- Over 477,000 students enrolled in fall 2021
- Over 112,000 undergraduate degrees awarded in 2020-21
- 116,839 new undergraduates enrolled
 - 95% were CA Residents
 - 93% of first-time freshman came from California schools





Standardized Testing in Undergraduate Admissions

- Test score use was suspended for the 2021-22 and 2022-23 academic years due to the COVID-19 pandemic
- After careful study and review the Admission Advisory Council (AAC) recommended the permanent discontinuation of the use of SAT and ACT test scores.
- CSU Board of Trustees will vote at the March 22-23, 2022, meeting on this recommendation



Dual Admissions

 Part of Postsecondary Education Trailer Bill (Assembly Bill 132)

- First-time freshman not eligible for CSU admission
- Beginning in May 2023 after admission decisions
- Three years to complete ADT or transfer requirements





Dual Admissions

- Dual Admissions Agreements will be part of CSU Transfer Planner
- Students will receive information about campus options and requirements
- Students that filed a FAFSA or CADAA will receive financial aid estimate
- Will need to balance local area students





Housing

- Campuses have over 50,000 bed spaces and 1,293 units
 - Does not include Fresno, Monterey Bay & San Marcos
 - Operated by Auxiliary Organizations
- Foster youth received priority for on-campus housing
- Budget Act of 2019 provided rapid rehousing funding for students with housing instability
 - Seven campuses assisted 1,127 students
- SB 169 HE Student Housing Grant Program \$500 million
 - 50% for CCC, 30% for CSUs and 20% for UCs






CCC transfer gains 2017-2021

- Over 30% of new undergraduates are transfer students.


CCC Transfer Admission






Fall 2022

UC application filing period


UC application timeline:

- Application will continue to open on August 1
- NEW filing period: October 1 November 30
- Please remind your students that the date by which a students submits their application will not be a factor in the selection process for admission.
- TAU will also open earlier December 15 but priority deadline will remain January 31

AB 132 – Dual Admission

- Part of 2021 Budget Trailer Bill
- Establishes a 3-year pilot program to guarantee transfer for ineligible freshman applicants
- TAG-based guarantee with wraparound services
- Pilot to begin with fall 2023 cohort





Teacher Effectiveness is the leading predictor of K-12 student achievement (Hattie, 2008; RAND 2012).



Teachers who inspire hope improve outcomes for their students (Duncan-Andrade, 2009).



Role of CA Community Colleges in Teacher Preparation

- CCCs recruit, prepare, and support over 85% of the state's early childhood education workforce.
- Over half of all CSU graduates complete their lower-division preparation at a CCC.
- More than half (55%) of the candidates earning a credential from CSU begin their journey at a CCC.





Teacher and student diversity in California 2018-19



Diverse Educators Needed

- There is a lack of teacher diversity and large disparity between the number of teachers of color and students of color. In CA, 75% of students are students of color, whereas only 40% of teachers
- Teacher shortage disproportionately impacts low income and minority students
 as teachers with emergency credentials are twice as likely to be hired in lowincome schools and three times as likely to teach in high minority schools
- A diverse teacher workforce has a positive impact on student outcomes, attendance, college attendance, fewer suspensions and disciplinary actions, and higher referrals to GATE/gifted programs for not only students of color, but all students.

Child Development Master Teacher permit

24 ECE Units + 16 GE units + 6 specialized units + 2 Adult supervision units + 350 days (3 hrs per day) Experience

Child Development Site Supervisor permit

AA or 60 units + 24 ECE Units w/ core courses + 16 GE units + 6 Administration units + 2 Adult supervision units + 350 days (3 hrs per day) Experience + 100 days of supervising adults

Child Development Program Director permit

BA or higher + 24 ECE Units w/ core courses + 6 Administration units + 2 Adult supervision units + site supervisor status and 1 program year of site supervisor experience.



Early Childhood Education Specialist

- The need for Universal Transitional Kindergarten (UTK) has prompted a HUGE need for Early Childhood Educators (est.8,000-10,000 teachers)
- Currently, TK teachers need a Multiple Subject Teaching
 Credential + 24 units of Child Development
- The CTC is currently looking to re-purpose the existing Early
 Childhood Education Specialist Credential to fit the needs for PK-3 educators
- CTC is considering the ECE Specialist Credential as an 'add on' authorization for individuals with a Multiple Subject AND those with a Child Development permit and a B.A.

Basic Requirements for the Preliminary (TK-12) Teaching Credential

- Bachelor's degree
 - From an accredited college or university
- Basic Skills Requirement (BSR) more on next slide
 - Demonstrate proficiency in reading, writing, and math

NEW

- U.S. Constitution requirement
 - College course or examination (POLT 101)
- Subject matter competence
 - Must document expertise and knowledge of the subject you plan to teach
- Professional preparation program
 - Often called a credential or 5th year program; includes student teaching
- Character Clearance
 - Fingerprint Check





Basic Skills Requirement

What is it?

· This is a requirement that must be met before the California teaching credential or certificate will be issued. To fulfill this requirement, applicants must demonstrate basic skills proficiency in reading, writing, and math.

Who needs it?

• The requirement needs to be met by those who want to apply for a credential or certificate to serve in the public schools of California. This requirement may also be required as a condition of employment to work at a school district.

How do I meet this requirement?

Complete **ONE** of the following options:

Pass the CBEST

- Tests reading, math, and writing skills
- Only needs to be passed once
- Offered computer or paper based
- · Must earn total score of 123 or above

Pass the CSET:
Multiple Subjects
AND
the CSET: Writing
Skills Exam

Achieve acceptable SAT or ACT Scores for English and Math

Pass a Basic Skills
Exam from another
state

Basic Skills Requirement New Options starting July 2021

Meet requirement using college-level COURSEWORK in English, Math, and Reading/Critical Thinking

- Completed a Regionally Accredited Institution, including community colleges
- Must have earned a "B-" or better
- Must be degree applicable
- Must have earned 3 semester units (or more)

OR

Combining Coursework and Exams

Basic Skills Requirement Coursework Option

For Coursework options:

- Courses from Plan B (CSU Certification)
 - A2 Written Communication
 - A3 Critical Thinking
 - B4 Quantitative Reasoning

And Plan C (IGETC)

- Area 1/Group A English Composition
- Area 1/Group B Critical Thinking
- Area 2A Quantitative Reasoning
- Other English, Math, Philosophy, etc. classes can also be used (need a B- or better)

CBEST



- The CBEST is designed to test basic reading, mathematics, and writing skills found to be important for the job of an educator; the test is not designed to measure the ability to teach those skills.
- Offered two ways:
 - 1) computer-based, administered at a test center
 - 2) online-proctored test, in which you may test remotely (e.g., from home, workplace)
 - *paper-based was retired as of April 2021
- Cost: \$30 per section



Elementary Teaching



Multiple Subject Credential

This credential authorizes a person to teach in a classroom where many different subjects are taught by a single individual, such as elementary schools.



Subject Matter Competence

Elementary Teachers Must Know...

- Language Arts
- Math
- Science
- Social Science
- Visual & Performing Arts
- Physical Education and Human Development

*All new elementary school teachers must demonstrate subject matter competence

Subject Matter Competence Options

- Option #1 Complete an APPROVED Program:
 - Complete a state approved Elementary Subject Matter (ESM) WAIVER program.
 - Requires very specific GE and major courses
 - AA-T in Elementary Teacher Education
- Option #2 Successful completion of courses that align with the ESM domains
 - Requires a transcript review by credential program staff
- Option #3 Take the CSET Multiple Subject <u>Exam</u>:
 - Pass the CA Subject Exam for Teachers (CSET) Multiple Subjects





Subject Matter Competence

New Options starting July 2021

- Option #4 Complete a Bachelor's degree or higher in an Academic Major in the Subject they will teach:
 - For **multiple subject credentials**, the major must be in liberal studies or an interdisciplinary major that includes coursework in the content areas identified in California Education Code
 - For **single subject credentials**, the major must be in one of the subjects named in Education Code
 - For **education specialist credentials**, either a major in one of the subject areas in which the commission credentials candidates or a liberal studies
- Option #5 Use a combination of coursework and exam options



AA-T Elementary Teacher Education

- Prepares you for the Liberal Studies* Major at most CSU's (*other majors also available)
- Prepares you in Subject Matter Competence
- Includes all classes required for CSU GE (except Area F)
- CAUTION: Some CSUs have removed 'similar major' status

Secondary Teaching



Single Subject Credential

This credential authorizes a person to teach the specified subject in a school setting.

Education Specialist Credential

- This credential authorizes a person to work with children with special needs. The person holding this credential can work with elementary, junior high or high school students.
- Five Specific Teaching Credentials:
 - Mild to Moderate Support Needs
 - Extensive Support Needs
 - Early Childhood Special Education
 - Visual Impairments
 - Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing

Formerly called "Special Education Credential"



Play an important role by creating pathways and educational plans for success, connecting to resources, and establishing personal relationships.



Role of Counselors in Transfer Success

- For aspiring Latinx teachers, the role and importance of Counselors is one of the **most important** factors contributing to their transfer success
- Counselors assist with the critical academic planning, course selection, and transfer assistance needed to navigate the completion of their AA degrees and to successfully transfer.
- Multiple appointments with the same Counselor over the course of the participant's time in community college, built trust and confidence as well as a strong relationship.
- Not all experiences with Counselors were described as positive.

Most common concerns:

- Felt rushed
- Not helpful
- Counselor did not have enough knowledge of teacher credential pathways



Role of Counselors in Transfer Success (Continued)

Counselors demonstrate Socratic and Audacious hope.


